RESEARCH QUESTION

Do voters care about regulatory provisions in trade agreements, independent of their trade effects? If so, why?

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- ► regulatory provisions affect agreement support, beyond their economic impact
 - ► evidence from conjoint experiment

 - ► evidence from vignette experiments

What do we know

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WHAT DO WE KNOW

Trade preferences are influenced by

- ► Individual economic interests (Balistreri 1997, Scheve and Slaughter 2001, O'Rourke and Sinnott 2006, Mayda and Rodrik 2005, Beaulieu 2002, Hainmueller and Hiscox 2006)
- ► Sociotropic economic concerns (Rho and Tomz 2017)
- ► Cultural factors (Mansfield and Mutz 2009, Kaltenthaler and Miller 2013, Margalit 2012)

EXPANDING TRADE AGREEMENTS

TAKE-AWAYS

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- ► Technical barriers to trade (TBT) & sanitary and phytosanitary measures (SPS)
 - ▶ Prevent and eliminate non-tariff barriers to trade
 - ► Help further facilitate trade flows

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 - ► Prevent and eliminate non-tariff barriers to trade
 - ▶ Help further facilitate trade flows
- ► Labor & environmental regulation
 - ► Lenient rules are a source of comparative advantage
 - Raising standards can stem the tide of trade flows

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- ► Economic effects through trade flows

 - ► Illegitimate sources of comparative advantage (Rodrik 2010)

WHY MIGHT REGULATION AFFECT TRADE PREFERENCES

- ► Economic effects through trade flows
- ► Policy process
 - Sovereignty and the national right to regulate (Abbott and Snidal 2000; Moravcsik 2000)
 - ► Illegitimate sources of comparative advantage (Rodrik 2010)
- ► Policy content
 - ► Safety of products
 - ▶ Well-being of workers and the environment (Ehrlich 2010)

SURVEY

- ► Conducted in the United States and the Netherlands
- ► Wave 1: conjoint experiment
- ► Wave 2: vignette experiments
- ► $N \approx 2000$ each



Does regulation affect preferences beyond economic concerns?

TESTING INDEPENDENT EFFECTS

	Trade Agreement A	Trade Agreement B
Tax on imports	Small reduction	Small reduction
U.S. trade deficit	Decreases by \$8 billion	Increases by \$3 billion
Partner type	Small developed country	Large developing country
Economic impact	Increases GDP by \$2 billion	Increases GDP by \$20 billion
U.S. sector most benefited	Consumer electronics	Automobiles
U.S. jobs	20,000 jobs lost	Unchanged
Labor standards	Made stricter in partner country	Unchanged
Environmental regulations	Unchanged	Made stricter in partner country
Food safety standards	Unchanged	U.S. lets in food products if trade partner says they're safe

WHY DO LABOR & ENVIRONMENT PROVISIONS MATTER?

- ► Unfair source of comparative advantage
- ► Want to help workers and protect environment

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 - ► Leveling the playing field
 - ► Improving lives/environment

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- ► Two potential arguments given:
 - ► Leveling the playing field
 - ► Improving lives/environment
- ► Asked whether support politician's decision

WHY DO HEALTH & SAFETY PROVISIONS MATTER?

- ► Sovereignty; countries get to set their own rules
- ► Concerned about safety of products


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 - ► Towards country or international standard
 - ► Product category

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- ► Vary features of the regulatory content
 - ► Stricter or less strict
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 - ► Towards country or international standard
 - ► Product category
- ► Asked whether support ratification

SOVEREIGNTY VS SAFETY



Country - United States - Netherlands

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- ► Regulatory components matter beyond their trade effects
- ▶ Because people care about the substance of these policies
- ► Need multi-dimensional understanding of trade agreement support



- ► Weighting variables: age, gender, education
- ► Control variables: age, gender, education, income, employment status, party, trade attitude

OPEN-ENDED RESPONSES

- ► After conjoint, asked what most influenced their choices
- Regulatory features mentioned by 16% of US and 25% of NL respondents
- ► In US primarily health & safety, in NL equally health & safety and labor & environment
- Clearest predictor of mentioning regulation: partisanship

INSUFFICIENT PROVISIONS?

- ► Vignette describing recently negotiated trade agreement
- ► Description of pros and cons of ratification
- ► Two possible treatments:
 - Environmental benefits as benefit of the deal
 - Additionally, complaint provisions are insufficient
- ► Asked whether support ratification

EXPLAINING TRADE EFFECTS

- Vignette explaining regulatory harmonization
- ► Treatment: explicitly explain that harmonization will increase trade flows
- Asked whether generally support inclusion of regulation into trade agreements



BASELINE KNOWLEDGE OF AGREEMENT CONTENT

- What kind of content do people believe is in trade agreements?
- ► Respondents see eight policy areas each (of 16)
- ► Stratified randomization, see four yeses and four no's
- Asked whether commonly included in trade deals (Yes/No/Not Sure)
